# Will it Have Been Worth the Wait?

As my greenhouse was in the process of being populated, I was looking to expand my collection. The collection had suffered a major blow when we had first gotten in southern Indiana because of our water softener and growing in Wardian cases limited the kind of orchids one can easily grow.

At the Kentucky Orchid Show in 2008 I purchased from Eric Michael (Hoosier Orchids at the time) a small Encyclia mounted on a small piece of cork. *Encyclia dickinsoniana x edithiana*. Eric told me that before it would bloom it should become a rather large plant.

The plant liked the conditions in the greenhouse and took off growing. Pretty soon it outgrew the cork slab and remembering what I was told, mounted it on a rather large slab. I could not remove the plant from the small slab, so it all got mounted on the large slab. And still it grew!

Needing a lot of light the mount was hung on the outermost south east corner (greenhouse: lean-to to the garage, faces east with a glass wall with door on the south side; brick wall on the north side). The plant was doing very well and kept on growing but no flowers. It now reached the top of the large slab!

With the cold spells we've been having these past few winters, we assumed that the north wall, a decorative stone wall (which makes the double garage look larger but also a nice decorative finish), would be hollow brick and decided to insulate this wall by attaching a two-inch sheet of Styrofoam. I did loose 'hanging space', but gained lots of heat. All of a sudden, the north side is the warmer side of the greenhouse.

Being a warm grower, the mount was moved to the NE part of the greenhouse and hung close to the grow light. (Our winters do lack sufficient light for many orchids and since I use an insulating tarp during the winter, which cuts down the light by 25%, we hung grow lights, a few still fluorescent but most LED).

Late February I noticed something sticking straight up from the nice fat pseudobulb, a flower spike!

I took the first picture on the 5<sup>th</sup> of March and the spike was 18 cm. I had to move the slab lower because it got too close to the light.

On the 22<sup>nd</sup> March the spike was 33 cm and it still keeps on growing!

What will the flowers look like? Have not been able to find anything about this cross nor have I found a picture. Tried the RHS but nothing showed for the cross.

I did find on <u>http://www.orchidspecies.com/</u> a picture from each of the parents, and looking at the pictures do wonder why this cross was made. The growing requirements are the same for both, warm, bright light but no direct sun. Dickinsoniana hails from Mexico, Guatemala and central America, while edithiana hails from Brazil. Both bloom spring into summer. Both are fragrant!

And now we wait! Monitor regularly if all is still as it should be. Spike keeps growing and the mount may be moved even lower, who knows?

Below is a picture of each of the parents, it is anyone's guess what the cross will look like!? After 15 years we may finally know!

# Mid America Orchid Congress (MAOC) meeting

Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> March 2023. Donna Lipowicz presented.

PowerPoint presentation of the different functions in an orchid society/orchid structure. How to get and keep new members and looking at the different positions within a society that new members could be involved in.

Different societies had different approaches about getting new members and keeping them engaged. Some societies managed to recruit 50 new members! That was the maximum, most had 3-6 new members. As of yet it was not known how many would keep attending meetings since most societies had just begun their community activities.

It was agreed on in the discussion that new people want to learn how to grow orchids, hence culture talks are of most value.

Keeping them engaged can be done in different ways, some societies offer new members an orchid plant when they pay their membership for the first time. Others teach them how to mount an orchid providing the bark and ordering seedlings, and for a nominal fee they walk out with a mounted orchid. (Stephen has done that in our society last year). KOS has its yearly project plant.

Don't forget the use of the AOS webinars as there is a lot of information there that can be accessed for free to member societies. (Donna mentioned the webinar: Visiting the Huntington Gardens orchid collection).

Also, there are 16 presentations on the MAOC website under the heading 'Education'. All the way down on the screen page, most of them are via YouTube and some deal with growing certain types of orchids. https://midamericanorchids.org/education

Donna updated on the snow damage at the Buffalo Botanic Gardens. They lost more than \$10,000 worth of orchids. There is insurance for about \$7,000. They will be doing a campaign so that in the new design of the botanic garden they will be able to have a 'Victorian Orchid Collection in a Victorian Greenhouse'. Looking at 2024-2025 to get it all done. M. Chadwick will help with getting them some of the Cattleya species they lost. Overall, they are very happy with the help they received from other societies and thanked everyone for their contributions.

From all the attending societies one was picked to receive a talk by Fred Clarke, paid for by MAOC. Winner was MVOS!

Meeting was kept to one hour!
