Plant Doctor/ Beginner's Corner

Those ugly brown-black spots! Where do they come from? I used to believe that it was impossible to grow oncidiums outside during the summer without getting the tiny brown spots that they got every year. One summer I got fungus all over my narrow leaved phrags and brassia. It's taken 3 years to get rid of the old plant leaves and those spots with them. And what about those bigger spots on dendrobiums, maxallaria, and bulbos to name a few? Most of these are due to fungal or bacterial or both infecting the leaves of our plants. Some stay just on the leaves making a mess and causing premature death of the leaf. Some become systemic (go all through the plants systems). In the case of oncidiums, their leaves experience micro sunburns on the surfaces exposed to light. Bacteria and fungus invade the burned areas too tiny for us to see, and next comes tiny brown spots. The combination of water, temperature and humidity are responsible for most of the rest.

Lately, our hot days, cool nights, and lots of rain have produced the perfect conditions for the fungus and bacteria among us to take advantage of our plants, long before we will become aware. Once those spots come, leaf death is the only way to get rid of the mess, though treatment will stop the spread.

PREVENTION IS WORTH A POUND OF CURE!

While nothing will kill every single one of these infections, Physan 20 (NOT Physan 27) diluted at 2 tsp. per gallon, sprayed monthly as a preventative is worth the effort and positive outcome! It will not cure or kill Black Rot but does most other fungus and bacteria common to orchids if caught early. For me it has cut out almost all new infections. Yes, I do see spots occasionally on dying leaves. That's normal. It's relatively safe where chemicals are concerned <u>if</u> <u>used according to the label</u>, and also acts as a disinfectant. It's available on Amazon and at New Earth as well as a couple of the big garden centers in the city.

The time to act is now! Don't wait for the spots to come.
